Dear Supervisor Cazzari;

We are pleased to submit our proposal for professional engineering services required for the referenced investigation. JRFA's understanding of the project is as follows:

PFOA/PFOS are man-made chemicals that, due to their oil and water repelling properties, have been manufactured and used around the world since the 1940s. Routine PFOA/PFAS samples have been collected in all Carmel Water Districts as directed by the Putnam County Department of Health. The results in Districts 3, 4, 5, 6, 9, and 12 exceed the NYS Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) of 10 parts per trillion for both chemicals, rendering these Districts non-compliant to the New York State Sanitary Code. The Putnam County Department of Health has directed PFOA/PFOS treatment at these facilities. NYSDOH cites Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) as the Best Available Treatment for PFOA/PFOS. Before committing to individual treatment plants at each District, JRFA recommends the evaluation of alternative methods to provide safe drinking water to the District residents. These alternatives should include:

- Operational changes at the facilities;
- Drilling additional well or wells;
- Alternative sources of supply;
- District consolidation;
- Treatment options;
- A combination of alternatives.

The objective is to find the most cost-effective method of providing safe drinking water across the referenced Districts.

While all Districts have conducted sampling as discussed above, Carmel Water District 8 has not experienced any exceedance of the MCL's to date. However, due to the presence of a State Superfund Site in downtown Mahopac, the NYSDOH has sampled private wells around the hamlet. To date over 100 hundred of these wells have been sampled; with one exception, all have tested positive for PFOA/PFOS. The NYSDOH has provided bottled water to these residents and has installed point of entry treatment (POET) systems at approximately half of them. This proposal will consider the requirements for an expansion of the existing Carmel Water District 8 to address the contamination of private wells for these residents.

SECTION 2 - WORK BY OTHERS

JRFA's scope of work, as specified in this proposal, is limited to the Work outlined in Section 1 above, with additional work to be performed upon request. We propose that samples be collected and delivered to the lab by the Operators and billed to JRFA. JRFA will provide assistance to the Town in the procurement and coordination of other additional services, as required. SECTION 3 - ESTIMATED COSTS AND SCHEDULE

JRFA can commence work immediately on this project.

It is estimated that Tasks 1.1 through 1.9 can be completed within 210 days of Notice to Proceed. Since the scope of work is identical for each District and is not based on District size, we offer a flat rate of \$17,500.00 per District, excluding costs for sample collection and analysis as discussed above. We will pass these on as direct costs without a handling fee.

It is estimated that Tasks 2.1 through 2.8 can be completed within 240 days of Notice to Proceed. The estimated cost for Tasks 2.1 through 2.8 is \$42,000.00.

Any costs for additional services as outlined below will be billed under our Hourly Rate Schedule (see attached). These costs will not be exceeded without prior authorization of the Owner.

SECTION 4 - PAYMENT SCHEDULE

We will bill you monthly as the work progresses; payment is expected within 30-days of receipt of our invoices. We reserve the right to discontinue or suspend work if outstanding invoices exceed 45 days.

In April, the Town Engineer responded to the Putnam County Health Department who at the direction of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), gave six months to obtain a proposal for a facility plan and twelve months from now to develop a solution to the contamination issue.



 Asset Management Program - Includes an industry "best in class" CMMS - computerized maintenance management system that captures the history of all the Town's assets; this includes maintenance and repairs for all assets. We have implemented a datadriven proactive maintenance program to extend the useful life of your assets and reduce unexpected failures. This includes tracking warranties, determining predictive and preventive maintenance tasks, and generating work requests and work orders. CMMS is a



tool that helps create annual budgets and capital planning by measuring asset conditions and expenses. The mechanics have also transitioned to tablets to capture accurate time information and improve the accuracy of the work order data.

- Key Performance Indicators Each plant has tailored process control plans, SOPs, and key process indicators to give the operators a detailed set of instructions for consistent operations.
- WIMS operational daily logs for each Facility All operations data is input daily and tracked to ensure adherence to the process control plan. Information is also used for regulatory reporting.

Value Added Services Provided by Inframark

Water Main Re-Lining Project - Worked closely with the outside engineering firm and the Town over system layout and functionality. Assisted in identifying issue areas within the distribution system to redirect funds/ necessary repairs once it was discovered some sections of main did not require lining. Overall, it helped improve the Water District #2 distribution system by redirecting work to key areas not initially scoped in the re-lining project resulting in a more reliable distribution system.

Water Main / Service Locating - Located and identified water mains alongside each re-lining contractor. They assisted in identifying types of pipelines underground not previously noted in district maps which contributed to whether they were lined.

Tank Rehabilitation / Replacement Project - Worked closely with the outside engineering firm, contractors, and the Town to ensure public safety was not at risk. Stayed multiple times off hours to monitor tank filling operations. Shut down said operations once it was deemed unsafe. We had numerous conference calls with Weston and Sampson to agree on a new safe plan for refilling the Water District #3 storage tank. Once the tank was filled, we worked with the Putnam Department of Health to take the necessary coliform samples to restore the tank to regular operation. Since this was the first District to have this work performed, all information and pitfalls found were shared with Bee and Jay to alleviate issues they may encounter throughout their rehabilitation projects and to avoid any unnecessary burdens on district residents.

Emergency Call Outs - Responded to emergency call-outs from residents regarding leaks/pressure issues throughout this rehabilitation process. At the Town's request, we installed the temporary water connection to 3 Crosshill Road to alleviate tensions with the resident. Previous attempts from another contractor led to a leak inside the resident's home, and it was decided Inframark would be the best option to ensure no further issues occurred. Tensions with the resident were smoothed over, and the temporary service served them throughout the filling process to ensure they had safe drinking water supplied to their home.

Carmel Water District #2 Diatomaceous Earth Procurement - Procured five pallets of diatomaceous earth from Northern Westchester Joint Water Works at no cost to the town of Carmel. Worked with Putnam County DOH for approval of using this Diatomaceous Earth. Inframark ran test trials at Water District #2 and reported to Putnam County DOH to ensure all safety concerns had been met. We are actively transporting the Diatomaceous Earth from Cortland Manner one pallet at a time with Inframark vehicles and personnel. This service was a \$5,000 savings for the Town.

Annual Price Adjustment

For each calendar year starting on January 1, 2025, the parties shall negotiate an increase to the Operator's Base Compensation for each subsequent Calendar Year in good faith. If the parties cannot agree to an increase in the Base Compensation by the start of each Calendar Year, the Operator's Base Compensation will be automatically increased by a maximum of 5% CPI increase. The prevailing wage rates, if applicable, will automatically increase per State of New York Labor Laws.

If Inframark is required to pay prevailing wages when performing the services, the Town is to pay Inframark for the prevailing wage rates plus a 10% administrative fee; however, there will be no percentage markup adjustments throughout the length of the agreement. No additional labor cost will be charged to the Town for installation of provided equipment that would be installed by Inframark staff employees (pump replacement, communitor grinder, etc.)

***The following will allow for the prevailing wage rates to drop significantly. For any prevailing wage work performed during regular business hours as per State of New York Labor Laws, all Inframark contract assigned employees will have a \$25.00/hour reduction from their applicable prevailing wage rate to account for their compensation under the Base Compensation. Should prevailing wage work be performed during nights, weekends, or holidays, the above rates may differ per State of New York Labor Laws. Inframark will make every reasonable effort to manage the work such that prevailing wage work is performed during regular business hours.
