

Mr. Iannicarri presented the Deputy Town Clerk with a written statement from the Chamber of Commerce outlining their thoughts and suggestions for a new master plan they are requesting be implemented for the year 2020. He pointed out that the current Master Plan is seventeen years old and asked the Town Board to support their position to build a town everyone can be proud of while switching the tax burden off the homeowners.

Supervisor Schmitt asked Councilman Schneider and Councilwoman McDonough to follow up with the Chamber of Commerce.

Councilman Lupinacci suggested that not only is a new master plan needed but that the Town Code should be updated as well. He noted that these two things should be done together.

Mr. lannicarri agreed that the Town Code should be directed by the Master Plan.

Mr. Tom Fitzpatrick, resident of Glenvue Drive, stated that he and his neighbors are having major problems with their water and wanted to know what is going to be done about it and when.

Supervisor Schmitt asked which water district they were in.

Mr. Iannicarri did not know but it was determined that they are in Carmel Water District #2. He then showed the Town Board a bottle of brown water that he explained came from his tap. He noted that this problem has been discussed for two years and wanted to know why it was not on tonight's agenda.

Greg Folchetti, Legal Counsel, explained that it was removed from the agenda pending a decision on the scope of work that was going to be done. The Town Board will have

to decide whether to reline or replace the pipes in the problem areas only or district wide.

Mr. Fitzpatrick told the Town Board that they need clean water now.

Supervisor Schmitt acknowledged that this is a priority.

Richard Franzetti, Town Engineer, responded that they will be doing a "super flushing" of the system to push out the sediment which they are hoping will clear out the lines temporarily. He stated that they are looking into relining the pipes.

Councilwoman McDonough inquired about getting temporary water, at least for drinking and cooking, in the meantime.

Councilman Schneider agreed that something must be done to provide clean water and this should be a top priority. He stated that the relining will be looked into for the long term solution but that they should be on a dual track for solutions.

Richard Franzetti, Town Engineer, stated that there are about thirty residences being effected.

Discussion between all the members of the Town Board and Mr. Fitzpatrick was held regarding the flushing and getting bottled water for the residents.

Richard Franzetti, Town Engineer, stated that the water will be tested after the flushing.

Discussion was held regarding the timeline for a permanent solution.

Greg Folchetti, Legal Counsel, explained that it would depend on what the Town Board decides to do as far as relining or replacing the pipes. He further explained that the project would have to go out to bid and funding would have to be obtained which would affect the timeline.

Councilman Lupinacci expressed his frustration with not being aware of the problem over the last two years. He noted the importance of the infrastructure of the town.

The possibility of digging private wells was briefly discussed.

Joan Dusenbury, resident of Glenvue Drive, stated that they have been in their home on Glenvue Drive for thirty years and that the house is sixty years old. Mrs. Dusenbury pointed out that clean water was a right and that the bottled water was a good idea but not a permanent solution. She also noted that there are many homes with young children that need bath water and cases of bottled water won't do it. She mentioned that she has to go to the laundromat to wash their clothes.

Councilman Lupinacci asked how long the flushing of the system has been going on.

Richard Franzetti, Town Engineer, reported that all the water districts are flushed twice a year.

Further discussion was held regarding various options to the water problem.

Mr. James Dusenbury complimented the Town Board for taking this problem seriously noting that having clean water should be a priority. He also acknowledged that Richard Franzetti, Town Engineer, has been very responsive in regards to this issue.

Councilman Lupinacci addressed the need to be proactive and work on improvements for the Town's infrastructure every year.

Councilman Schneider noted that they are working on an asset management program in regards to the sewer infrastructure and that they would add the water infrastructure as well. He agreed for the need to be proactive and not reactive.

Mr. Fitzpatrick expressed his concern with the timeline previously discussed noting that the project needed to be done sooner rather than later and that this was an emergency situation.

Supervisor Schmitt agreed and discussion was held regarding what needed to be done to constitute this as an emergency and how that would affect the timeline for the project.

Michael Barile, resident of the Town of Carmel, stated that he liked some of what the Town Board has said but not other parts. He indicated that tests of the water are currently being done every month.

Councilman Schneider responded that although the water is tested every month it is tested at the plant and not from the end user.

Mr. Barile reported that he had a conversation with one of the water operators who was concerned that the water systems could fail if we have a deep freeze. He also questioned why this was discussed four weeks ago and then the Town Board took off for three weeks.

<u>OPEN FORUM – TOWN BOARD COMMENTS</u>

Supervisor Schmitt announced the Fall Concert Series taking place at the Mahopac Chamber Park on Saturdays from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on September 9th, 16th and 23rd.

Councilman Lupinacci announced the "Guns & Hoses" Golf Outing to be held on October 2, 2017 at 9:30 a.m. at Mahopac Golf Club on North Lake Blvd. in Mahopac.

Councilwoman McDonough announced the "Autumn Chores" Flower Show presented by the Lake Mahopac Garden Club to be held on Friday, September 15, 2017 from 2:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. and on September 16, 2017 from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Mahopac Public Library. The event is free and open to the public.

Supervisor Schmitt announced the fifth annual "TYathalon" to be held on Saturday, September 9th starting at 7:00 a.m. at the McDonald Marina in Mahopac. The event organized by Burt Melchner benefits Pediatric Cancer Research.

Councilman Lombardi reminded everyone that the first day of school was upon us and to please be careful driving. He noted that the Carmel Police Department will be following the school buses to ensure that all traffic rules were being followed.

ADJOURNMENT

All agenda items having been addressed, on motion by Councilman Lombardi, seconded by Councilman Lupinacci, with all members present and in agreement, the meeting was adjourned at 8:50 p.m to the scheduled Executive Session to discuss a personnel matter with Mary Ann Maxwell, Town Comptroller.
